The circulatory system

- The circulatory system transports substances around the body. It includes the heart, veins, arteries, capillaries and blood.
- The heart is an organ. It constantly pumps blood around the circulatory system. The heart pumps blood to the lungs to get oxygen. It then pumps this oxygenated blood around the body.
- Veins, arteries and capillaries are the three types of blood vessels.
- Water and nutrients (substances needed by the body to function) are transported around the body through the digestive and circulatory systems.

Similarities & Differences between UK and a place in South America

- Brazil is located on the continent of South America:



- The climate in the UK is mainly temperate (mild summers and mild winters) and the climate in Brazil is mainly tropical (hot and humid).
- The highest mountain peak in Brazil is Pico da Neblina and the highest mountain peak in the UK is Ben Nevis.
- The largest river in Brazil is The Amazon and the largest river in the UK is The Severn.
- Brazil has a larger population than the UK.
- The capital city of Brazil is Brasilia.
- One of the most famous human features in Brazil is the Christ the Redeemer statue which is in Rio de Janeiro.
- One of the most famous physical features in Brazil is The Amazon Rainforest.
